

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## Cutting WOF = Width of Fabric

**Note:** Keep cut squares grouped by fabric and size and keep all the squares oriented so the prints are right-reading for easier cutting and construction.

#### Fabrics A-E, and G-O, cut:

(1) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" x WOF strip, subcut (2) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares. From remainder of strip cut (4) 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" x 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" strips, subcut (14) 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares.

#### Fabric F, cut:

(1) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" x WOF strip, subcut (2) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares. From remainder of strip cut (4) 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" x 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" strips, subcut (14) 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares. (10) 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" x WOF for binding

#### Fabric P, cut:

(15) 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" x WOF; subcut (240) 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" squares

### Instructions


**Note:** Use a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub>" seam allowance throughout. Sew all pieces with right sides together and raw edges even using matching thread. Press after each seam.

#### **Block Construction**

Remember to keep all the squares oriented so the prints are right-reading throughout the following steps.


1. Cut all Fabrics B, F, and N 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" and 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares in half diagonally once only as shown (bottom right to top left). Fig. 1


2. Arrange (8) 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" Fabric P squares and (14) 27/8" Fabric B triangles in (8) offset rows as shown. Stitch into rows. Sew rows together. Make a total of 2 Unit 1. Fig. 2

3. Stitch the long edges of (2) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric B triangles to both long edges of a Unit 1. Make a total of 2 Fabric B blocks (161/2" square unfinished). Fig. 3



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
 Cut all Fabrics I, K, and M 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" and 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares in half diagonally once only as shown (bottom left to top right). Fig. 5


6. Arrange (8) 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" Fabric P squares and (14) 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric I triangles in (8) offset rows as shown, in the opposite direction of Unit 1. Stitch into rows. Sew rows together. Make a total of 2 Unit 2. Fig. 6


 Stitch the long edges of (2) 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" Fabric I triangles to both long edges of a Unit 2. Make a total of 2 Fabric I blocks (16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" square unfinished). Fig. 7




8. In the same manner, make 2 each **Fabrics K** and M blocks. **Fig. 8**



9. From Fabrics A, C, D, E, G, H, J, L, and O, cut 1 each 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares and (7) each 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares in half diagonally once only as shown (bottom right to top left). From the remaining Fabrics A, C, D, E, G, H, J, L, and O 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" and 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" squares, cut all in half diagonally once only as shown (bottom left to top right). 


10. Make 1 each Unit 1 and Unit 2 using Fabrics
A, C, D, E, G, H, J, L, and O 2<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" triangles and Fabric P 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" squares. Fig. 10

11. Make 2 each Blocks A, C, D, E, G, H, J, L, and O using Units 1 and 2 and the respective 14<sup>7</sup>/<sub>8</sub>" triangles (16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" square unfinished).

## Quilt Top Assembly

- **12.** Noting **Quilt Layout** arrange all blocks in (6) rows of (5) blocks each, noting orientation of diagonals and making sure all prints are right-reading.
- **13.** Sew the blocks into rows, backstitching at top of top row and bottom of bottom row. Press all the seams in a row in the same direction, and alternate directions from row to row.
- **14.** Sew rows together, nesting seams, and backstitching at beginning and ends of seams.


#### Finishing

- **15.** Sew together the 2½" **Fabric F** binding strips end-to-end using diagonal seams. Press seams open. Press the binding strip in half wrong sides together.
- **16.** Layer backing (wrong side up), batting, and quilt top (right side up). Baste the layers together and quilt as desired. Trim excess batting and backing even with the top after quilting is completed.

- 17. Leaving an 8" tail of binding, sew the binding to the top of the quilt through all layers matching all raw edges. Miter corners. Stop approximately 12" from where you started. Lay both loose ends of binding flat along quilt edge. Where the loose ends meet, fold them back on themselves and press to form a crease. Using this crease as your stitching line, sew the two open ends of the binding right sides together. Trim seam to ¼" and press open. Finish sewing binding to quilt.
- **18.** Turn the binding to the back of quilt and hand-stitch in place.
